## David Marshall Dead.

DAVID MARSHALL, Esq., passed away quietly, at his late residence, Wednesday night, about 10 o'clock. He had been a sufferer from a chronic ailment, contracted in the army, for a great number of years, and his death was not unexpected. Drs. McGee and Nixdorf attended him in his last sickness.

Mr. Marshall was a native of Scotland, having been born at Auchtermuchty, Fifeshire, January 12, 1818, and died just eleven days prior to his 62nd birth-day. He emigrated to America in 1855, stopping in New York City. In 1870, he came west, settling at Tuscumbia in October of that year. For a number of years he was deputy clerk of the circuit and county courts of Miller county, under Mr. Robinson, and afterwards postmaster at Tuscumbia; he also filled some minor positions of public trust. He was a faithful and obliging public officer, an agreeable associate, a kind neighbor, an affectionate husband and father. Bro. Marshall was a Royal Arch Mason, an Odd Fellow and a member of the G. A. R. Only a short time land fore his demise he carefully pasted his certificate of election as H.P. Tuscumbia R. A. Chapter, No. 87. on the inner lid of his Bible, thus demonstrating the high respect in which he held the Order and his regard for the honor conferred.
