About this same time, there was Robinett's Wagon Shop approximately a half mile down the crick, later known as the Roy Plemmons farm. In this shop they made lynch-pin wagons constructed entirely of wood. They soaked the hubs with homemade soap to keep them from screeching. They also made ox carts, spinning wheels, looms ox shoes, bull tongue plows, and a few cord beds.
