ANOTHER FISH STORY

Brumley, Mo.—Sherman Robinett and Will Brown went fishing a few days ago on the Glaize. They had neither bait nor hook, but each was armed with a good gig and a keen eye. Each was in a boat by himself and quietly floating down the stream, eagerly watching for something to show up. Will soon spied a big catfish lying behind a log. He quickly and deftly threw the gig and made a bulls-eye hit but the fish made a few lunges and broke the gig handle. This was hard luck for Mr. Brown and he had to call for aid. Mr. Robinett quickly responded, thinking Mr. Brown was hurt. When Mr. Robinett was informed of what had happened they waited for the muddy water, caused by the commotion, to clear away. When the water had cleared sufficiently a search was made and Mr. Robinett succeeded in locating the fish. With a sure aim of years' experience he struck the fish with his gig and after a few moments of excitement succeeded in bringing the fish to the bank. After pulling the fish out of the water it was weighed and it tipped the scales at 50 pounds. Mr. Robinett is one of our champions in the use of the gig. SCHOOL CLOSES AT WRIGHT

A real enjoyable day was spent at the Wright school house Friday, NMarch 9, by teacher, pupils and patrons of the school as well as visitors. Miss Faye Wright was teacher and a report of attendance shows that the pupils were deeply interested in the work.

The total enrollment was 25; 11 came every day and five of the 11 were never tardy. The average daily attendance was 23 and 119-320 or a record of 94% which is unusually good.

Those who came every day were Ruby, Hazel, Irene, Lloyd and Royal Kallenbach, Reva, Veva, Marie and Carmen Hicks and Mary and James Blackburn; Arlie Hicks and Nellie, Henry and Ernest Kallenbach missed two days and Helen Blackburn missed 2 1/2 days.

Nearly all patrons of the school were present and a basket dinner added greatly to the pleasures of the day. The last day program given by the teacher and pupils was also enjoyed very much by all present.

RIVER IS RISING

Miller County was visited by an all-day steady downpour of rain Sunday. The rain was general throughout Missouri and as a consequence the Osage is rising. The stage of the river was 12 feet Tuesday morning and still rising. Flood stage is 21 feet. It was about this time last year that the river began rising and in April developed the 39-foot rise.

The rain was general throughout Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Colorado and as the wheat in sections of these states had not germinated on account of dryness this rain may prove a "billion dollar" shower.
